Our members also include emerging, aspiring and student writers.

We have been negotiating better pay and working conditions for writers since 1959. The national agreements we have in place cover key employers, including the BBC, ITV, National Theatre, Royal Court and Royal Shakespeare Company.

We have attracted high-profile members throughout our 60-year history and continue to do so today.

We lobby and campaign on behalf of writers, to ensure their voices are heard in a rapidly changing digital landscape, and we wield influence over politicians in Westminster, Brussels, Holyrood, Cardiff Bay and beyond.

We offer a range of benefits to our members, including free training, contract vetting, a pension scheme, Welfare Fund, entry to our Find A Writer directory, a weekly ebulletin, plus member-only events and discounts.

RECENT ACHIEVEMENTS

In Animation

- We have produced Guidelines for Animation Writers.
- We have produced a best-practice guide for industry professionals in collaboration with the Personal Managers' Association.
- Children's animation scriptwriters are now eligible for the WGGB pension.

In Audio

- We negotiated special fees for BBC podcasts.
- We meet regularly with the BBC to raise issues on pay and conditions for radio writers, which are enshrined in our national agreement with the corporation.
- We organise the annual Tinniswood audio drama script award, alongside the Society of Authors, which is presented at the BBC Audio Drama Awards.
- We have run events, including How can writers survive in a podcasting universe?

In Books

- We surveyed writers on the practices of contributory publishers who charge authors to publish their books the results will form the basis of a joint campaign with the Society of Authors to tackle bad practice.
- We have supported libraries, museums and galleries against devastating cuts.
- Our Books Committee represents poets and non-fiction writers as well as writers of prose and deals with various issues of relevance to them.

In Comedy

- We run special events, including Where are all the women comedy writers?
- We supported Comedy 50:50, an initiative with ITV, RTS, ERA 50:50, Funny Women and BAFTA to implement measures to address gender imbalance in comedy, starting with writers.

In Film

- We have a presence on the industrywide Covid-19 Screen Sector Taskforce, a BFI-organised group coordinating feedback to the Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport.
- Our Locked Box deal with the British Film Institute (BFI) ensures that writers now get a share (alongside producers and directors) of recouped income from feature films supported with Lottery Funding through the BFI Film Fund (and held in a 'locked box' for reinvestment in the British film industry). There is around £100,000 earmarked for writers.
- We have launched joint guidelines with Directors UK on creating positive collaborations
- We have run a series of free, exclusive WGGB member film screenings, and offered members the chance to attend film premieres, including Q&As with writers, directors and leading cast members.
- We are working on revising our film agreement with Pact.

In Television

- We launched a new guide to the 'created by' credit, joint guidelines with Directors UK and a guide to showrunning in the UK.
- We have run a campaign, Free is NOT an Option, against unpaid work in television.
- We continue to negotiate and update our minimum terms agreements with the BBC, ITV and Pact (representing the independent producers).

- Writers Digital Payments, set up and run by WGGB and the Personal Managers' Association, ensures writers get paid whenever their work is shown on digital services like BBC iPlayer, and has paid out over £6 million to writers to date.
- We continue to engage with major SVOD players in an attempt to improve the terms of employment for writers.
- We have negotiated pay increases for Emmerdale writers to bring them into line with ITV's other flagship soap Coronation Street.

In Theatre

- We launched new digital principles for theatre to protect playwrights' rights following the explosion in streaming and online delivery of stage plays during Covid-19.
- Playwrights commissioned by the National Theatre will enjoy new protections for digital use of their work, following terms agreed by WGGB under its umbrella TNC Agreement.
- We have produced best-practice guidelines to protect playwrights and the health of the theatre sector during the Covid-19 lockdown.
- We regularly negotiate significant minimum rates increases with UK Theatre, the Independent Theatre Council and TNC (representing the Royal Court, Royal Shakespeare Company and National Theatre).
- We hold annual Olwen Wymark Theatre Encouragement Awards.
- We organise the annual Literary Managers' Forum to discuss issues directly with the theatres and the production companies.


In Videogames

- We have launched new guidelines for games writers and those who work with them.
- We hold events, including an annual panel event with the International Game Developers Association and week-long online festivals of games writing.

Across several of our craft areas

- We heard the call of young activists in the Youth For Climate / School Strike movement, and declared a climate emergency, pledging to put the climate crisis at the heart of all we do and supporting Film Strike for Climate at COP26.
- We lobbied Government during the Brexit negotiations and beyond to ensure writers' voices were on the agenda.

- We are campaigning against plans to privatise Channel 4.
- Our Equality Writes campaign continues as part of our core union work to support and advocate for all under-represented writing groups.
- We have run special events to mark Black History Month and Disability History Month and also celebrated LGBTQ+ History Month.
- We have submitted evidence to Parliament, including Breaking the Class Ceiling, an inquiry launched by the Performers' Alliance All-Party Parliamentary Group, which is tackling the lack of working-class writers, performers and musicians.
- We work collectively with other unions and organisations to combat bullying, harassment and discrimination in the creative industries.
- We have launched a new guide to writing competitions.



Adele Rose 1933-2020

Adele Rose was Coronation Street's first female and longest serving writer, having written 457 episodes between 1961 and 1998.

Rose was born in Salford and started as a secretary at the Granada Studios. She realised the series had no women writers and suggested to the producers that the show needed some. Jack Rosenthal, then writing regularly for the series, suggested that Rose submit a script. Rosenthal mentored her and they co-wrote some episodes together. Rose was hired.

Susan Pleat joined Coronation Street in 1966 as a storyline writer and remembers Rose didn't have an easy time amongst all the men, "Adele was the only woman writer in the writers' room. She stood out in an immaculate white dress, carried herself with dignity and held her own."

ITV's John Whiston also acknowledged Rose's contribution. "Not only was Adele a trailblazer, being the very first in what is now a long line of brilliant female *Coronation Street* writers, she was also particularly adept at giving voice to some of Corrie's classic fearless female characters, from Ena to Elsie, from Bet to Liz."

In 1989 Rose was asked to write a one-off drama about a youth club. She created *Byker Grove* which ran until 2006. It was where teenage Ant and Dec met and the rest is television history.

Rose's writing credits include series as varied as *Z-Cars*, *Angels* and *The Dustbinmen*. She also created *Girls About Town*, a comedy about feminism, and *Second Chance*, a drama about divorce partly based on her own experiences. She wrote for *Crossroads* under a pseudonym.

In 1993 Rose received a BAFTA Award for her screenwriting on *Coronation Street*, as well as several Writers' Guild Awards. When asked why she joined the WGGB, Rose replied, "Because I strongly believe we need our own trade union to protect our rights."

Ena Sharples would have been proud.

Ronald Harwood: 1934-2020

Ronald Harwood was a screenwriter, author and playwright, best known for The Dresser and his Oscar-winning script for The Pianist. He was also a former WGGB Chair during a particularly volatile time in the Guild's history.

Harwood was born in South Africa and, like his cousin Antony Sher, came to Britain to act. From 1953 to 1958, Harwood became the dresser of the larger-than-life actor/manager Sir Donald Wolfit. Harwood took great pride in his work, "I loved the job, was very good at it, and didn't feel demeaned at all."

By 1959 he was an out-of-work actor; about to take a labouring job on the Hammersmith Flyover when his father-in-law gave him a typewriter. His writing career was launched.

Harwood wrote various television plays, including *Private Potter*, starring Tom Courtenay, about a soldier being accused of cowardice during the Cyprus emergency. Harwood also went on to write screenplays, including

One Day In The Life Of Ivan Denisovich, based on the book by Aleksandr Solzhenitsyn.

Theatre remained Harwood's main love. His most famous play, *The Dresser*, premiered at the Royal Exchange in Manchester in 1980, based on his experience of working with Wolfit. The play transferred to the Queen's Theatre in London and went on to become a film with Albert Finney and Tom Courtenay. *The Dresser* had a West End revival in 2005.

Harwood became Chair of the WGGB in 1969, when the Guild was riven with internecine debates (largely regarding South Africa and Czechoslovakia) and whether the Guild should have a political opinion. As described in Nick Yapp's book about WGGB history, *The Write Stuff*, Harwood was a man of strong principles with a strong dislike of "politics of gesture."

Harwood was one of many to oppose a decision to send delegates to the International Writers' Conference in Moscow at a time when Soviet writers were being imprisoned for not toeing the Communist Party line.

Geoffrey McGivern, who was in the original cast of *The Dresser*, recalls Harwood's "endless, affable energy. Oh, and his glee when he got flown to the USA and back on Concorde! He was a lover of life."

Co-Chair of the WGGB Books Committee and Write Stuff author Nick Yapp said: "I interviewed Ronald for The Write Stuff in 2009. He was a lovely man to interview – quick and detailed in his memories, and phrasing his answers to questions in a way that made them ready to go to press without any contribution from the interviewer. He was Chair of the Writers' Guild at a very tricky time, so tricky that the 1969 AGM never started – the floor refused to accept Standing Orders."
