



APPLICATION PROCESS

Where can I find information about the application process?

All the required information can be found on this website – please refer to the How To Apply page, read all the FAQs and look at the application form. The process has been designed to be light-touch and not over-burdened with administration. If you have any questions not answered in any of the supporting documents, please e-mail using the Contact Us form on the website.

What supporting information will the application require?

In addition to completing a simple application form, requiring information from both writer and producer about the proposed commission, applicants will be required to send examples of the writer's work (not to exceed 10 pages), the producer's most recent financial statements (annual audited accounts) and a completed Equal Opportunities form.

Who should complete the application?

The application should be submitted by the producing partner, but information will also be required from the writer, so the process of completing the application should be done collaboratively to ensure all relevant information is included.

What support is there for writers from under-represented groups?

As part of NPCCS's commitment to Equality, Equity and Diversity, a key number of awards have been reserved for writers currently under-represented in the theatre writing community. If you would like your application to be considered for one of those places, there is an opportunity to state this within the application form.

In which formats will you accept samples of previous work?

Documents can be submitted as Microsoft Word or PDF files, or as a JPG or PNG image files. Each document should not be larger than 4MB. If you wish to submit video or sound files, these should be provided as links to host sites such as YouTube, Vimeo, Soundcloud or Band Camp.
